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According to Joseph Campbell, some people are specialists and some are generalists. I belong to the later group. At the age of four, I wanted to be a flamenco dancer, an actress, a pilot, and an artist. While this is no longer my career plan, I still have broad interests. I have a deep love of art and I wish to cultivate my artistic skills. However, I also want to be able to study my other passions because they will create a foundation that gives my art depth and authenticity. That foundation consists of an understanding of spiritual, cultural, and psychological development. I want to read great stories and understand what makes them great; I want to comprehend the historical and cultural contexts underlying art, literature and other creative expressions; I want to know about how human beings develop into creators and communicators and why they choose to express themselves through the arts; and I want exposure to the creative expressions of other cultures and traditions. I live in a privileged, protected environment, I see missed opportunities for creating beauty. I want to seize those opportunities cultivate beauty. Even if people do not value beauty, they still unconsciously respond positively to it. In the University of Redlands meditation room, for example, the ceiling tiles, TV set, and fluorescent lights are all covered by soft, yellow drapes. This simple addition grants the room a peaceful, safe quality, and people who enter it find themselves naturally becoming quiet, respectful, relaxed, and rejuvenated. Bringing beauty to the world is a worthy cause to which I can contribute.

I love hearing stories and experiencing things that stir my imagination. I find artistic inspiration in spiritual traditions, literature, music, dance, and history. I draw because it is fulfilling, makes me feel positive, and helps me process my experiences. The creative process is invaluable because it is how I give my life meaning. C.G. Jung understood this when he said, "Meaning makes a great many things endurable – perhaps everything."

If I am accepted into the Johnston Center for Integrative Studies, I can foresee planning a cross-cultural experience and senior project course involving my deep interest in art and my broad but related interests in spirituality, psychology, culture, history, anthropology, and literature. I would love to use the May Term of my junior year to begin my Senior Art Project. My plan would be to collect, analyze, and illustrate

folk tales of New Mexico. I would especially love to collect New Mexican folklore because of its cultural diversity. This project would provide me with a way to gain multicultural experience and use my art.

When I arrived at the University of Redlands, I thought that a degree in fine art would satisfy me. However, after taking classes in religious studies and psychology, I realized that that path did not have the breadth that I need and want in my education. That is why I am now applying to the Johnston Center for Integrative Studies.

For me, art is a healing and reflective tool as well as a narrative one. I draw for myself, but I believe my art can nourish others by mirroring their feelings and providing a sense of connection. Human beings have fundamental needs to belong and be understood. Art that makes the viewer say, "Yeah, I've felt like that too," satisfies those needs. A piece that touches deep emotions demonstrates that another person shares that experience. Creative expression can be a path to healing and I intend to be a part of a collaborative mountain retreat in the Pecos Mountains of New Mexico where I can practice my art and be a part of helping others to heal and foster their own creative expression. I believe that participating in the Johnston Center is the next step in my journey toward that goal.

This will serve me well and help me lead a productive and happy life and thereby help others discover their own joy and potential.
